SDP Update March 2021

Here is the termly update on the progress we are making as a school towards our current priorities and to ensure that we strive to achieve our vision that <u>'Everyone Succeeds'</u>

We don't report on every single priority each term but provide details of evidence of the areas that have been highlighted so far this academic year.

Students achieve the highest academic standards

Continued focus on raising the achievement of all students from their specific starting points.

As you will probably remember we regularly feature excellent work from students on the weekly Head's Blog, it is a great way to promote excellence and give students' learning a wider audience. It is also beneficial for all of our families to see what learning takes place in the school. Even in lockdown this continued, thank you to Ms Hunns our new Lead Teacher of Food Technology for sharing this excellent work where students have produced dishes at home as part of the practical side.

William Courtnell 7C, made an excellent rainbow salad, replacing the starchy carbohydrate to meet dietary requirements, his presentation is brilliant with a garnish of spring onion.



Otto Malm 8S, made an excellent batch of bread rolls which are well risen and golden brown. The plait roll in particular has been executed with accuracy and precision.



Development of our new curriculum to embed cross curricular links and effectively develop rich knowledge

Throughout the lockdown period we have continued to provide a broad and balanced curriculum offer, a good example of this would be the PSHEE offer. We also shared this specifically with parents as an overview weekly. An example of this is here:



Tutorial lessons, which cover Careers, PSHEE and Citizenship resume for all year groups this Friday, and are available in your child's year group tutorial google classroom. The codes for these classrooms (which your child should already be accessing) are on the careers area of the school website: https://sites.google.com/a/dhsb.org/iag/home

Lessons do not generate homework or marks but often form part of statutorily required subject areas, and all would greatly benefit from discussion whenever this is possible.

The lessons this week, 15 January, are as follows.

Year 7

The Year 7 lesson is about disability, with students asked to consider various disabilities, what issues those concerned might experience (especially in school) and what others may be able to do to help. They will use some of the "creature discomforts" videos to suggest ideas.

Year 8

Year 8 students have a lesson about career "families", and are beginning to think about job availability in their local area - does this necessarily tie in with what you want to do? They are also asked to complete a brief google form about their career intentions which will be used to target opportunities/advice which may arise in the future, and can use the Panjango online resources, a game-like exploration of different careers.

Year 9

Year 9 students are beginning to work on their employer challenge. This was originally an opportunity to visit a local employer for a guided tour and a chance to work on a work related project set by the company.

This obviously had to change as we were not able to visit, but three local companies, Babcock, Princess Yachts and Bailey Architects agreed to work with us by setting a project the boys could do in school, which was introduced and explained to each class just before Christmas. We have now had to adjust further due to the current lockdown but are hoping that students can at least begin planning their group project from home. They should all have been advised of their groups (generally five students) by their tutor. There will be a chance to continue with this in a couple of weeks, although of course they won't be able to complete until we are all back in school.

Year 10 and Year 11

Year 10 and Year 11 students have the same lesson, all about surviving stress which I'm sure you'll agree is very topical. Younger year groups will have a similar lesson next week. They will learn about sympathetic and parasympathetic nervous systems, how stress manifests itself, and try some potential solutions.

Emphasis on ensuring all students are challenged and make excellent progress in their learning.

Whilst this week we are celebrating the success of students gaining offers for the highly competitive courses at Cambridge we are equally pleased for other students who are receiving offers for a variety of higher education and degree apprenticeship courses. The fields of Medicine, Engineering and Law continue to be increasingly popular study areas for those going into higher education as well as 'Employment' in the Business and Financial sector. Alongside these areas, a number of students are planning varied gap year opportunities and pathways. For these leavers in particular we encourage them to be patient and to take the time to explore their intellect and talents, while having fun and developing their entrepreneurial skill set in an 'adaptive' sense, This will be increasingly significant as our society moves through this pandemic.

Collaboration and Community

eSafety

Throughout this year we have been specifically providing our parents with weekly eSafety updates specifically designed to take into account the increased use of technology at home due to Covid-19 and the remote learning environment. This takes a balanced and personalised approach whilst providing advice, we have had good feedback from parents about this. Here is an example from the beginning of January as we entered the most recent lockdown:

The new lockdown is a good opportunity for us to retouch on advice that was given last time as a refresher and also to reach out to our new Year 7 parents. Being inside, inevitably means more device time. Here is a short guide on parental controls and how to use them for some peace of mind.

Parental Controls

Parental controls are software and tools that allow you to set controls on all kinds of internet enabled device, there are many available and these can be summarised as:

- Network level controls are set on the hub or router and apply to all devices connected to that hub or router (covering your whole household.)
- Device level controls are set on the device itself, such as a smartphone, and will apply regardless of how and where the device is connected to the internet.
- Application controls are set on the platform or application that is being used.
 Examples of this would be the settings applied to Google or YouTube.
 Check they are set on each device your child has access to.

Most internet providers offer free filters giving you control over what internet content comes into your home. This means that any device that connects to your home broadband

is subject to the controls that you have set on your home router or hub. All major games consoles come with controls as do the majority of internet enabled devices.



Around the World in 40 Days

As a way of keeping physically and mentally fit and staying connected our PE Department organised a fun activity to see how far we could collectively 'travel' around the globe in 40

days. Students could run, walk, cycle, swim, row, kayak, paddle board, horse ride etc but the distance travelled and recorded had to be using a physical form of transport.

We asked students and families to record their distance on a google form.



Mr Orkney has confirmed we recorded 25,251 miles by midday on Saturday 6 March, just before all students and staff returned to school. He added, "We have had 2,585 entries and it has been a magnificent effort. Huge thanks to everyone who took part. Well done to you all". In the end we took 50 days in total to reach the distance.



Grow the influence of the DHSB Alumni in inspiring the next generation in the build up to the DHSB 125

In January it was Founder's Day which marked 125 years of DHSB, unfortunately due to Covid-19 all of our celebration plans have been put on hold and we are beginning to plan for events to take place next academic year.

In February we paid our respects to the school's founder, Alonzo J Rider, who died 100 years ago.

Mr Rider passed away at his home, which adjoined the school (in its original Albert Road location) on 9 February 1921.

After retiring in 1906 he was still very much involved with the school as the Chair of Governors. In one of his final speeches he expressed his paternal pride in Devonport High which he had founded 22 years previously. On the anniversary of Alonzo's death I was able to pay tribute to him by placing a wreath, from DHSB, on his grave.
